Each summer, we choose a Jewish theme that guides our programming. This summer, we will have weekly themes to guide our learning and connections.

- Week 1: Sakranut (Curiosity) What's different about camp and home? Asking questions to get to know my cabinmates and counselors, leaning into new ideas
- Week 2: Shalom Bayit (Peace in the home). How can I help my cabinmates, solve conflict, and be an active community member?
- Week 3: Yira (Awe) a deep appreciation for all that we have, spending quality time together, being grateful for the little things at camp

In addition, we are always guided by the core values of Jacobs Camp, which include:

We sprinkle Hebrew education throughout camp life, and all of our campers participate in Kehillah, which is creative and fun Jewish programming that includes Israel education, shira (music), and t'fillah (prayer). <u>Israel education</u> is always evolving and age-appropriate as it relates to the current situation. At the end of the day, our focus is always on a love of being Jewish, and on connection with our Israeli counselors.
